
HUTTON CHURCH OF ENGLAND GRAMMAR SCHOOL NEWSLETTER APRIL 2025

Wishing you all a blessed Easter and a wonderful holiday.






UK Maths Trust Challenges

Old Huttonian Association



The 'Old Huttonian Association' (OHA) has been around since March 1921 and is effectively the 'alumni' of the school. It was introduced by the then Headmaster, Major the Reverend C.P. Hines, one of the most influential leaders the school has seen. He was a visionary and created the role of prefects, the house structure, and led the way in the development of the school and supervised a building programme resulting in much of the school estate as it exists today.

It is worth noting that the objectives of the OHA, as recorded in the constitution of 1921, are;

- (a) To provide a link between past and present members of HGS, whether the same are or have been pupils or masters.
- (b) To provide and assist opportunities for personal intercourse between the members as amongst themselves, and between members and the school.
- (c) To do all such things as are possible, in the interests of the school, or for the advantage of members.

All of this was under the watchful eye of the association's inaugural President – Sir Henry F. Hibbert and there has been a President every year since – the current one being Mr. John Settle who was at the school between 1967 and 1974.

Membership 'shall be confined to past pupils of HGS, and past and present members of the teaching staff of the school', eligibility criteria which still holds good today. So, if you are reading this, and you meet the requirements, and you are not already a member, then <u>click here</u>, or email the Secretary at oha@huttongrammar.org and sign up - it's free, not like 1921 when it was an annual subscription of 5 shillings!!

Once a member, you can then help support the school and the association whilst enjoying the company of other like-minded people, particularly by attending the 'Annual Reunion Dinner'. This year's event promises to be even more popular than ever and will take place at the school on Saturday 27th September 2025. So save the date!! 


Attendance Matters






